

From the Vicar...

Lent has always been a time when we spend some time reflecting upon our lives, looking back in order that we can look forward to Easter. Advent we may deal with easier as in preparation for Christmas we make room in our lives to receive a baby, who wonderful and awesome that is. During lent we prepare ourselves to relive the story of Good Friday and Easter. We can be joyful for the end result, but not the journey towards it. From Maundy Thursday, through Jesus' betrayal, trial, conviction, judgement, torture, and death, how do we respond to this story. I remember with fondness childhood memories of walking around the parish I lived in on good Friday, singing, 'Were you there when they crucified my Lord', 'The old rugged Cross' and of course 'When I survey the wonderous cross' (among others.) The idea was not to bring the misery of Good Friday to those whom we were trying to mark the occasion for and to, but to bring the hope that is seen in Jesus' sacrifice on the cross. Over the years I have often been told and told others that lent is about 'clearing out the rubbish of our lives' just like a spring clean in the house. Making sure we get behind the sofa, move the bookcase and clean those skirting boards! I am not sure that this is completely true, for some of us a time of reflection is needed and can be successful with time for prayer and bible study. However, we have had quite a bit of time to reflect over the past two years, looking at the way humanity treats each other, rejoicing in the Angels that have walked the earth and helped us over this quite difficult time. We have also witnessed the 'don't care about others and only yourself' group of people too. This Lent I ask something a little different of you, think about yourself. Draw a timeline of the good things that you have received over your time in this world and bring those to God and rejoice in him for them. When the chips are down we are quick to blame God, but when the results come in, we ourselves and others congratulate us on our hard work. Which is know is true, but if God is there to be blamed, he is also there to be praised for the ups and downs of our lives. In faith we ask God to walk with us in all our situations, not always getting the results is not a failure of ourselves or God, and when disaster happens, I do not believe that is in God's hands. I also don't believe it is the sins of the past coming back to seek vengeance. I do believe that this world is good and cruel, that the choices that the whole of humanity has made and makes has impacts upon our world. I have resigned myself to answers to many questions when I finally, and hopefully, am received into God's Kingdom. I don't know why we have diseases that kill us, but I do know we have a God who through Jesus has suffered and feels pain, and walks

alongside us, hearing our anguish, and holding our hand. This lent let us look at the good we have, from the roof over our heads, to friends who really care for us, family who listen to us and a God who promises to never abandon us.

TALES FROM THE GRAVEYARD FEBRUARY 2022



Shed repairs were the order of the day for January and February. As written last month, as the sheds were given a clean up, more problems were found with the structure of both storage places.

As can be seen from the two photographs, roof repairs were deemed essential for the wooden shed, and an area of bricks missing completely on the back wall of the main shed. This latter state was allowing vermin to get into the shed and needed to be re-

paired as a matter of urgency. With Hamilton House and the Flags being re-furbished at present, access was available to the back of these sheds before fencing was erected. This gave the team a short period of time to get all the repairs done.

As can be seen from the photograph below, Mark was able to locate a couple of slates and roofing felt to repair the shed roof whilst access was available. The brickwork was also re-



paired at the same time. However, a little plea from the Z Team. The wooden shed really needs some major repairs to the roof, so if anyone has any slates they no longer want, and would like to donate them to the church, please contact Mark or Ron and they can be collected. Having written all the above, the team have started on grass cutting and strimming again, as well as clearing the overgrown pathway at the far end of the graveyard that runs down to the Pool Bank Business Park.

From the Farm

After the Editor commented on Miss Briscoe distributing the magazine 125 years ago, it made me think about my husbands' ancestors. I think Miss Briscoe was Fridiswid (I love the name) who would have been about 19 at the time. She was one of nine children (5 girls and 4 boys) born to Samuel and Margret. They farmed at Laurel Bank Farm in Clotton which is still farmed by descendants. They clearly had a close association with St Peter's and the children were all baptised there (all except one girl who went to Hargrave church - wonder why!) There are two Briscoe family graves on the left by the entrance to St Peter's.

Fridiswid and her sister Ellen (always known as Neg) ran the Sunday school for many years until Neg's death in 1960. The two larger brass vases at the front of the church were purchased by Herbert Sheen's mother and presented to St Peter's in remembrance of her. Fridiswid and Neg never married but lived together and are buried in a grave to the rear of the church.

The youngest of the family, Charles Edward, joined up with several of his childhood friends and school mates at the beginning of World War 1. How awful to think what a heroic adventure they were probably expecting and what a dreadful time they had. Sadly Charles was killed on the 12th of April 1918 in Belgium where he is commemorated at Ploegsteert Memorial.

When I'm in St Peter's I sometimes imagine this family, all in their Sunday best, sitting in their pew and all the dramas that unfold in any family. I find it rather nice to follow in their footsteps - still delivering magazines in Duddon!

Carlin Sunday

Carlin peas are a traditional northern food eaten during lent on Passion Sunday, the Sunday before Palm Sunday. They are a small, hard brown pea known by many other names, such as: Maple Peas, Pigeon Peas, Brown Peas and Black or Grey Badgers and were first recorded during Elizabethan times.

The eating of Carlin peas during the period of Lent bears no religious significance but instead, seems to be linked to the civil war of 1644, where Royalist Newcastle was under siege from the Scots. The lack of food meant that the people on both sides of the River Tyne were dying of starvation. Legend has it that a French ship managed to dock at Newcastle with a cargo of Maple Peas. Other tales, tell of a ship, laden with peas, which became stranded at South Shields a fortnight before Easter Day. The peas were washed ashore and salvaged by the locals.

The real story is lost in time but for centuries, Passion Sunday (the fifth Sunday of Lent) in some Northern regions of England, became known as "Carlin Sunday" and the small brown peas became popular at this time.

I remember my Mother-in-Law from Sunderland telling me the rhyme "**Tid, Mid, Miseray, Carlin, Palm and Pace-Egg Day**", which helped people remember the order in which the Sundays in Lent fall.

Apparently, the saying is derived from the psalms, hymns and Sundays of Lent.

Tid - Second Sunday in Lent when the **Te Deum Laudamus** hymn was sung,

Mid - The third Sunday when the **Mi Deus Hymn** was sung.

Miseray - the fourth Lenten Sunday, was when the **Miserere Mei** Psalm was chanted.

Carlin - Passion Sunday, the fifth Sunday in Lent, adopted by the North Eastern regions as Carlin Sunday.

Palm - Palm Sunday, the sixth and final Sunday of lent.

Pace Egg - A corruption of "Pasch" from the Latin and Greek root for "Easter".

Cooking Carlins

There are a number of methods of cooking and eating these small peas.

These vary greatly from just soaking the peas overnight, then after rinsing, boiling until tender. They can then be served hot as an accompanying vegetable, or fried in butter, adding brown sugar and sometimes Rum.

They can also be eaten cold with salt, pepper and vinegar.

Served like this, they were to be found on the bars of many North Eastern pubs on 'Carlin Sunday'

(Note - salt should never be added during cooking as this actually stops the cooking process.)

Woodland Notes

Our annual Plant Sale.

For the two years of the pandemic, our plant sales, the principal fundraisers for the Trust, have been held in people's front gardens. This has allowed them to continue but has meant that one of the village's "events" on the High Street could not take place (and has also deprived Tarvin Methodist Church of a valuable fundraiser.) Now that there seems to be a chance of things getting back to something like normal, Trustees are planning the return of the Plant Sale to the High Street in the middle of May this year.

The **Plant Sale** for **2022** will be held on the forecourt of Tarvin Methodist Church on **Saturday 14th May** between **10am and 12.00 Noon**. As usual, there will be a wide range of herbaceous and bedding plants, shrubs, vegetables, tomatoes and many others. Indeed, where you have surplus plants, we would be grateful if you could pot them up and pass them our way - we can supply you with pots - just phone me. At the same time, Tarvin Methodist Church will be running a Coffee Morning and selling its famous bacon (or sausage) baps! It is a High Street event not to be missed - make a note of the date in your diary!

The Woodland "wakes up".

One of the problems I encounter when writing these notes each month is that I am thinking about the woodland perhaps two or three weeks in advance of you reading it. This may not sound a lot - but change can happen very quickly at this time of year. For instance, I hadn't walked in the woodland for almost a week when I took Bertie for a walk earlier this week. Previously, there had been some snowdrops in flower but very little else in the way of flowers was evident. This week, the snowdrops had, in places, turned into what looked like pieces of white carpet and a solitary clump of primroses shone like a shaft of yellow sunshine, even on a really dull day. The unseasonably warm weather is resulting in "spring" arriving earlier and earlier and that makes it even more difficult to try to predict what will be in flower at a particular time.

When you read this in early March, there will probably be garden daffodils in flower where guerrilla gardeners have previously planted bulbs but, despite St David's Day being on 1st March, I think it unlikely that our wild daffodils in the meadow alongside Fairfax Avenue will have come into flower that early. More likely to be flowering are the beautiful white Wood Anemones in the area around Hockenhull Lane. We might also find Lesser Celandines, the very earliest of the yellow buttercup flowers, in little clumps across the woodland. Once we are into March, the rate at which the woodland "wakes up" gathers pace, with a greater variety of flowers appearing and the number of flowers throughout the woodland increasing at a tremendous rate! This really is the best time of year to go "spotting" on your walks through the woodland. You will be surprised at how much there is to see and amazed at the rate of change which is evident, even sometimes day by day!

So much has been going on!

The months around Christmas are often considered to be the time of year when little or no activity goes on outdoors. However, during the past two months, our volunteers seem to have been busier than ever - a huge amount of work has been undertaken. The trimming of the woodland hedges was completed and boundary repairs have been made to the post and rail fencing that surrounds the woodland, mainly in the Saxon Heath section. Coppicing of some of our many hazels has continued, with the sturdy branches being used to top up our existing "dead hedges" and to create a new one. Simultaneously, felling of some trees within the wilding area has been undertaken, with the brash thereby created also being used in the dead hedges, as well as to produce new log piles. The woodland bird hide has been repaired, a second black poplar tree has been planted and a large number of specially grown wild flowers were planted in the meadow alongside Fairfax Avenue, Trustees have been out with three groups of schoolchildren to look at the woodland in wintertime and a survey of our woodland birds has been undertaken twice. That so much has been accomplished in such a short time by so few people is truly amazing - and they have enjoyed every minute!
